Training the Trainers to Help Beginners Secure Land and Succeed in Agriculture**

Nathan Aaberg

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Nathan Aaberg is the director of conservation and working lands at the [Liberty Prairie Foundation](http://libertyprairie.org), located in the Prairie Crossing conservation community in Grayslake, Illinois. Through this role, Nathan leads the Foundation’s farmland access work in north-eastern Illinois, which began in 2014 in partnership with the leading land trust in the region—Openlands. Prior to joining the Foundation, Nathan worked for Conserve Lake County in several roles, including Director of Development, Associate Director and Interim Executive Director. During his 10 years at Conserve, Nathan helped the organization transform from a local conservancy into a major countywide land trust, preserve more than 440 acres of open space, play a leadership role in the Liberty Prairie Reserve and more than double Conserve’s annual operating budget. Nathan developed a career in the environmental field after a number of experiences, including volunteering for restoration workdays. This led to his work writing grants and developing communications for Friends of the Chicago River, an urban river restoration group. Prior to Friends of the Chicago River, he worked for Mitsubishi International where, among other things, he managed the export of Winnebago motorhomes to Japan. Nathan earned his undergraduate degree from the University of Wisconsin – Madison and a master’s degree in East Asian Studies from the University of Michigan – Ann Arbor. Nathan also lived and studied in Japan for one year. A favorite memory is the day he spent helping his host family harvest rice from their nearby field.

Lillian “Ebonie” Alexander

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Ebonie Alexander is Executive Director of the [Black Family Land Trust, Inc.](http://blackfamilylandtrust.org) (BFLT). The BFLT is a niche land trust and one of the nation’s only regional land trusts dedicated to the preservation and protection of African-American and other historically underserved landowners land assets. Since joining the BFLT in 2009, Ebonie designed and implemented the African American Land Ethic and Wealth Retention and Asset Protection (WRAP) programs. Together these two programs have assisted landowners to retain family ownership and control of more than \$12.5 million of their land assets during the past five years.

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A native of Maryland, Ebonie has degrees in Public Administration and Nonprofit Management and lives in rural Virginia on land that has been in her family for generations. Ebonie is a proud Virginian, avid reader and lover of history; she can trace her family's history in Virginia to 1757.

Kevin Athearn

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Kevin Athearn is a Regional Specialized Extension Agent primarily serving North Florida. He has lived and worked in various parts of the United States, including Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Maine and Florida.
